## Noah Cain of Penn State, Cole Maxwell of Baylor and Patrick Paul of Houston Named 2021 Mayo Clinic Comeback Player of the Year Award Nominees

**NEW YORK, NY.** —The College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA), in association with The Associated Press (AP) and the Fiesta Bowl Organization has selected three college football student-athletes — **Noah Cain**, a junior running back for Penn State University; **Cole Maxwell**, a senior defensive lineman for Baylor University; and **Patrick Paul**, a redshirt freshman offensive tackle for the University of Houston — as nominees for the **2021** Mayo Clinic **Comeback Player of the Year Award**.

Ten times during the 2021 college football season, three inspiring student-athletes from all levels of college football who have overcome injury, illness, or other challenges, are recognized as **Mayo Clinic Comeback Player of the Year Nominees** by a panel of writers, editors, and sports information directors from CoSIDA, AP and *Touchdown Illustrated*. In December, three of the 30 nominees will be chosen as winners of the **Mayo Clinic Comeback Player of the Year Award** and will be recognized at a special ceremony during the PlayStation® Fiesta Bowl on Jan. 1, 2022, at State Farm Stadium in Glendale, Arizona. CoSIDA members can nominate football student-athletes until Nov. 1, 2021 at Comeback-Player.com.

Here's a look at the inspiring stories of this week's three honorees:

Noah Cain, a junior running back for Penn State University, earned the starting position for the 2020 Nittany Lions after an impressive 2019 freshman campaign in which he rushed for 483 yards and a school freshman record eight touchdowns in just 10 games. Unfortunately, on the first drive of the 2020 season opener versus Indiana, he suffered an injury that would sideline him for the remainder of the season. The native of Baton Rouge, La., earned back the starting position in 2021 in a very talented Penn State backfield. Through seven games, the 5-foot-10, 220-pound halfback leads the Nittany Lions with 78 carries, 245 yards and four TDs, including scores in the first three games of the season. Additionally, he leads all running backs with 10 receptions for 69 yards.

Cole Maxwell, a senior defensive lineman for Baylor University, has come back from two ACL injuries in his collegiate career. The first injury, to his left knee, came in practice during his redshirt freshman season (2018). Following a year of rehabilitation, in just his second career game in 2019 versus Iowa State, the native of Allen, Texas, tore the ACL in his right knee. The 6-foot-5, 295-pound defensive tackle appeared in a limited role in 2020. But this season, the fifth-year senior — who graduated with a degree in health, kinesiology, and leisure studies — has emerged as a leader for the 6-1 Bears, recording 18 tackles, including a career-high six versus Oklahoma State.

Patrick Paul, a redshirt freshman left tackle for the University of Houston, suffered an ankle injury in just the second game of the 2020 season, requiring surgery and sidelining him for the remainder of the season. The 6-foot-7, 315-pound native of Houston underwent ankle surgery and as a result he was unable to walk for 10 weeks. After an aggressive rehabilitation he earned his starting left tackle position back in 2021 and through six games, in which he played all 406 snaps, he was tied as the highest rated lineman among the five starters.
